



# Altissimo Fingerings for Alto Saxophone




F<sup>#3</sup>






1. Main fingering for accessing altissimo.
2. More stable if sax has high F# key; awkward to access higher notes.

G<sup>3</sup>







1. Main fingering.
2. Tends to be flat.

G<sup>#3</sup>





1. Connects well to A<sup>3</sup>-1, Bb<sup>3</sup>-1, B<sup>3</sup>-1 and C<sup>4</sup>-1.
2. Stable and good pitch.
3. Fragile and often hard to voice; connects well to G<sup>3</sup>-1.




1. Connects well to G<sup>#3</sup>-1, Bb<sup>3</sup>-1, B<sup>3</sup>-1 and C<sup>4</sup>-1.
2. Easy fingering to access.
3. Stable, but quite sharp.
4. Stable and in tune, but awkward fingering.

### B<sup>b3</sup>







1. Connects well to G<sup>#3</sup>-1, A<sup>3</sup>-1, B<sup>3</sup>-1 and C<sup>4</sup>-1.
2. Solid Fingering.

### B<sup>3</sup>






1. Connects well to G<sup>#3</sup>-1, A<sup>3</sup>-1, B<sup>b3</sup>-1 and C<sup>4</sup>-1.
2. Solid fingering that connects well to B<sup>b3</sup>-2.
3. Good fingering.

### C<sup>4</sup>





1. Connects well to G<sup>#3</sup>-1, A<sup>3</sup>-1, B<sup>b3</sup>-1 and B<sup>3</sup>-1.
2. Solid fingering that connects well to B<sup>b3</sup>-2 and B<sup>3</sup>-2.
3. Good fingering that connects well to B<sup>3</sup>-3.
4. Good alternate fingering on some instruments.

### C<sup>#4</sup>






1. Overblown fingering for E<sup>3</sup> (palm key E).
2. Can be unstable, but connects well to C<sup>4</sup>-4
3. Good alternate fingering.

### D<sup>4</sup>





1. Overblown fingering for F<sup>3</sup> (palm key F).
2. Easy fingering to access.

E<sub>b</sub><sup>4</sup>





1. Overblown fingering for F<sup>#3</sup> (palm key F<sup>#</sup>); best fingering if high F<sup>#</sup> key is present.
2. Stable fingering; same as A<sup>3-4</sup>.
3. Overblown fingering to C<sup>#3</sup>.



1. Best fingering.
2. Overblown fingering for D<sup>3</sup> (palm key D) and B<sup>3-3</sup>.




1. Best fingering; same as fingering for C<sup>4-4</sup>.
2. Overblown fingering for E<sub>b</sub><sup>3</sup> (palm key E<sub>b</sub>) and C<sup>4-3</sup>.

F<sup>#4</sup>



1. Overblown fingering for E<sup>3</sup> (palm key E) and C<sup>#4-1</sup>.
2. Same fingering as C<sup>#4-3</sup>.

G<sup>4</sup>



1. Same fingering as E<sup>4-1</sup>.
2. Good fingering.
3. Can be unstable.
